Using the strong, flexible leaves of the cattail plant, make a basketry cover for your water bottle. This class teaches you the basic twining method used by native people for basketry. Bring your own container (water bottle or glass) to cover.

Learn to felt a large item such as a rug or a blanket by participating in the SOS blanket felting project. Learn how to "lay on" the wool, make patterns, and full your project. Join Salmon Outdoor School "School of Discovery" for "The 1805 Experience – A Journey." See for yourself what it might have been like as you peel off the vestige of modern society and trek into a world where the essence of life is provided by the land upon which you walk. Use tools made from the earth, soften the hide of a deer for clothing. Prepare sinew for thread and use stone and bone to create useful items you will use daily. Learn about plants for healing and make your own medicines. Fashion containers from clay and weave baskets from native willow. See and feel what it might have been like for early people that were a part of a wilderness untouched by civilization. Peer into your own past and find that ancestral self who is self reliant, adaptable, multi skilled and practical, as you satisfy the primal urge within to live in harmony with the natural cycles of the earth.

"The 1805 Experience – A Journey" is a project in experimental archeology and applied primitive technology, recreating the daily activities and experiences of early people living in Frontier America in 1805. Participants may sign up for all or part of this project as their individual schedules permit. This year's focus will be primitive survival and self reliance. SURVIVAL CAMP

Level 1, Modern Man

\$250.00 per person or \$500.00 per family project fee

This is the first segment of a four year progressive education program that is designed to teach students ages 9+ basic outdoor skills, responsible use of and respect for the environment, teamwork, and mental and physical emergency preparedness. This week long program includes instruction on mental preparedness, making fire, finding or building a proper shelter, potable water, wild edibles, useful knots and cordage, first aid, emergency skills, and a practical exercise. It includes meals, materials, and a graduation dinner. At the end of the program, students will have basic knowledge of the skills outlined above, and a basic preparedness pack which includes a manual and over \$100.00 worth of preparedness items. (materials for fire making, water purification, and signaling, notepad and pen, space blanket, a first aid kit, cordage, basic food items and more.)

Student must come to class with sturdy shoes, water bottle, sunscreen, pocket knife and hat.

SURVIVAL CAMP

Level 2, Mountain Man

\$250.00 per person or \$500.00 per family project fee

This is the second segment of a progressive education program that is designed to teach students ages 9+ outdoor skills, responsible use of and respect for the environment, teamwork, and mental and physical emergency preparedness. This program includes continuing instruction in all of these areas, beginning where the "Modern Man" segment left off. It emphasizes skills used by 19th century mountain men, and includes but is not limited to, making fire with flint and steel, learning two additional ways to find and purify water, construction and use of a "quarter sphere" shelter, and identification of more wild edibles. Other skills, such as axe safety and use, trap and snare setting, tracking, making eating utensils, finger weaving, making a 19th century pack, and a possibles bag will also be covered. At the end of the program, students will have a basic knowledge of the skills mentioned above, and will have added to their basic pack a flint and steel kit, a possibles bag, a wilderness-made eating kit, a sewing kit, and basic food items.

Student must come to class with sturdy shoes, water bottle, sunscreen, pocket knife and hat.
